



Pandemic Response Planning, Enterprise Availability Program Review for Pandemics, and Incident Management Exercises can help you establish greater control

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A pandemic: widespread disease on global proportions is a frightening thought. In the case of the H5N1 avian influenza virus, the very real potential for a pandemic can be understood when we recognize that today, there is no known antiviral treatment for this strain of virus, and over the past few years, the mortality rate for people who are infected is over 50 percent. The World Health Organization (WHO) has tracked 499 known cases of the H5N1 virus globally, and 295 deaths have been reported as of early June 2010.

WHO and other government organizations in North America and Europe have all recommended that businesses take an aggressive posture toward planning for a pandemic. While no one can predict with certainty that a pandemic will occur, or when it might occur, statistics bear out the value of business and personal planning. In the past century, we have experienced three pandemics, so we know that the risks are real. The mortality rate for H5N1 is significantly higher than that reported for the 1918 Spanish flu, believed to be a variant of this same avian flu, where more than 50 million people died across the globe.

WHAT YOU CAN DO

Businesses have the opportunity to prepare for the impact to their staff now, and information availability practices have shown that those who plan in advance for a disaster fare better than those who simply react. Demand will rise for remote services and teleworking. Preplanning for these services will be essential in order for staff to respond effectively. Deploying technology to support remote access to systems and applications in the midst of a pandemic will be risky at best, and a business failure at worst.
